



Domaine de l'Amauve

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Dear Madam. Dear Sir.

Summer has begun.

The heat is here. While the northern regions of France are facing an exceptional heat wave, our region is simply in the midst of summer.

What will set this year apart from a normal one in the coming weeks is whether or not a series of thunderstorms arrives. If these storms don't come, we risk heading toward a summer similar to last year's—that is, too dry.

However, we did have some good rains in the winter and early spring. So the soil is still well-watered, and the vegetation (including the vines) has moisture available... at least for now. Only time will tell what this new vintage will be like.

One thing is certain: the harvest will start even earlier than last year due to the various heat waves we've experienced in recent months.

As of today, I'm planning to start the harvest before August 15 for both the white grapes for white wine and the red grapes that will be used to make rosé wine.

Today, I'd like to introduce you to one of my vineyards: It's located not far from the river (the Ouvèze). It's planted with Grenache Noir grapes.

It was planted by my grandfather Henri and my father Louis.

It is now 81 years old.

Since I want to keep these old vines—which produce exceptional grapes—for as long as possible, the vineyard is fully grassed to protect the vines from damage caused by tilling equipment.

The terroir consists of clay and sand deposited by the river. There are a few rounded pebbles. The soil is light in color.

At Domaine de l'Amauve, I preserve the old vines as much as possible. They are part of the vineyard's history. They produce less than younger vines, but my goal is not quantity. My commitment to quality requires limited yields.
